


A former radio and television sportscaster who started taking organ lessons as an 8-year-old in Chicago, **KEN DOUBLE** has enjoyed a second career focused on his love of the music of the theatre pipe organ.

As a sportscaster, Ken broadcast NBA and major college basketball, NHL, IHL and AHL hockey, the worldwide broadcast of the Indy 500, and more.



But since retiring in 2008, Ken has performed concerts on the great theatre pipe organs around the world. He also helped establish the Long Center Theatre Organ Society in Lafayette, Indiana; spent ten years as the President of the American Theatre Organ Society; and currently is one of the two organists who perform on Mighty Mo, the iconic 4/42 Möller pipe organ at the Atlanta Fox Theatre.

Ken Double performed his first concert in 1978; has more than 20 recordings to his credit; has toured Australia and New England 8 times; and in June of 2022 will celebrate his 40th anniversary concert at Long Center in Lafayette, IN. Skip's career includes work with Harry James, Sy Zentner, and the great of jazz and swing.

He and his wife, Cathy Chemi, former "girl singer" from the Harry James Orchestra, have been heard in concerts and appearances all across the mid-Atlantic following their tours with James.

Ken Double bio, continued

Ken has been thrilled to not only perform many times on the great Kimball organ for DTOS, but has been privileged to record the instrument twice, including the CD **TRIBUTE**. The disc also features trumpeter Skip Stine, who will again present his great solo stylings in this "streaming" concert from Dickinson High School. Among many credits, Skip toured with the Harry James Orchestra, and brings that distinctive sound to this performance.

Concert and recording artist, administrator, promoter and fundraiser, broadcaster and entertainer, Ken Double has enjoyed, as he says, "getting paid to have fun."

Review of Mark Herman Virtual Concert by Ron Stonehouse

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On July 12, 2008, a good friend of mine introduced me to the Dickinson's mighty Kimball. It was the first time Mark Herman performed a concert here and the last of the 2007/2008 season. I was so impressed by both, that I became a season ticket holder ever since.

His encore performance on Nov. 19, 2011 was my first concert reviewing and have enjoyed him here, at several ATOS conventions, a private home and in many virtual performances. All have been top notch! This evening was



his fourth time and although virtual, it was wonderful hearing him again especially with all the various viewing angles.

The concert began with a brief chat between Mark and our president Dr. David Ruth while standing by the already raised Kimball (another interesting beginning for a concert) after which Mark slid onto the bench and into the program of the evening with "music that he loves and an instrument he loves to play".

Up first a lovely and lilting version of **Baby Face** from 1926 with music by Harry Akst and lyrics by Benny Davis. Jan Garber and his orchestra had a number one hit with it and in the same year it was sung by the whispering baritone Jack Smith.

The next piece was from 1929 composed by Sammy Fain, lyrics by Irving Kahal, and sung by Gene Austin. Mark gave us a great version by alternating several times between classical sounds and a theatre organ sounds. The song title, **Wedding Bells are Breaking Up** (That Old Gang of Mine), is not to be confused with "That Old Gang of Mine" from 1923.

Next is one reason I enjoy doing the research for these concerts. From the musical "The Band Wagon" we get **Dancing in the Dark** by Arthur Schwartz with lyrics by Howard Dietz. I think of Fred Astaire and Cyd Charisse in their lovely routine from the 1953 movie but when

> looking up the music one discovers it was sung by Bing Crosby in 1931 for the original movie in which Fred dances with Adele. Learn something every day. Mark was able to coax the lush sounds from our Kimball on this one.

> Mark beautifully blended the next two pieces in a sweet medley arrangement. The first was **Spread a Little Happiness** by Vivian Ellis and Clifford Grey from the 1929 Westend musical "Mr. Cinders", sung by Jill Kemp. The second was **Smile** with instrumental music by Charlie Chaplin for the 1936 film "Modern Times" which is said to be inspired by Puccini's "Tosca". The lyrics and title were added in 1954 by John Turner and Geoffrey Parsons.

> The following selections were a tribute in memory of Vera Lynn who recently passed at the age of 103; Mark calls it Vera Lynn Medley. The order played is (A) **Be Like a**

Kettle and Sing (Tommie Connor, Walter Ridley, and Desmond O'Connor) from 1943 film "We'll Meet Again", recorded a year before by Mantovani and his orchestra. (B) White Cliffs of Dover (Walter Kent, lyrics by Nat Burton) written in 1941 and recorded in 1942 by Glen Miller. (C) There'll Always Be an England written in 1939 (Ross Parker and Hughie Charles) it was also recorded by Frank Sinatra and Nat King Cole. (D) A Nightingale Sang in Barkeley Square 1939 (Manning Sherwin lyrics Eric Maschwitz music) (E) We'll Meet Again (same info as C above) and became Vera's signature song. I really enjoyed Mark's arrangement on the last one.

When asked by Dr.Ruth," What is your favorite piece?", Mark said that he had many but he really likes **The Boy Next Door** from the 1944 musical "Meet Me in St. Louis" and performed there by Judy Garland. Written by Hugh Martin and Ralph Blane. One gorgeous arrangement by the way.

Mark Herman Review, continued

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Taking us into a short intermission was **Goody Goody** a great toe tapping end to the first half. Composed in 1936 by Matty Malneck with lyrics by Johnny Mercer. It was recorded by Benny Goodman, Freddy Martin, Bob Crosby and a few more. I rather liked Frankie Lymon and the Teenagers version in 1957. Found out that there were no Teenagers, Frankie did it all himself.

Would like to thank Mark here for sending me a complete playlist for the concert to aid in my review before the show was aired. He did a great job of telling us what he was playing during the concert too!

The second half began differently from most concerts with another different view of the console. The piece was composed in 1936 by Walter Donaldson, a prolific popular song writer whocomposed many hit songs in the 1910s through the 1940s, writing over 600 songs in all. Although **You** was a love song, Mark gave it an up tempo.

Mark gave **Memories of You** a nice Jazz treatment. Composed in 1930 by Eubie Blake and in lyrics by Andy Razaf. It was a hit for many including Benny Goodman.

DTOS 52nd SEASON

This has been a most difficult time for the DTOS family. We have tried to fill our hunger for theatre pipe organ music with virtual concerts, but nothing is like a live concert. We hope that the Ken Double/Skip Stine concert June 26 will be the last virtual-only concert. Starting in September 2021, we will resume live programs at the Dickinson Theatre.

Our schedule, as of now, includes 6 concerts and a revised Open House. The dates for the 52nd Season are:

Saturday, Sept. 18 – Open House at 2:30pm Saturday, October 9 – Concert at 7pm Saturday, November 20 – Concert at 7pm Saturday, January 22 – **Concert at 3pm** Saturday, March 19 – Concert at 7pm Saturday, April 30 – Concert at 7pm Saturday, June 11 – Concert at 7pm

We have verbal commitments from all the artists but do not yet have all their signed contracts. We will announce the names of the artists in the next issue of the Vox Humana which should be ready late in August.

Eubie was an American pianist, composer of ragtime music popular and vaudeville tunes and scores for musical theatre.

Next up, a Disney Medley with tunes from "Pinocchio" (P) in 1940 and "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" (SW) in 1937. In both movies the music was by Leigh Harline and Paul Smith. The lyrics for both was by Frank Churchill and Edward H. Plumb. The order performed are as follows: (some did double duty) **Give a Little Whistle** (P), **Someday My Prince Will Come** (SW), **Whistle While You Work** (SW), and **When You Wish Upon a Star** (P).

Hoagy Carmichael composed **One Morning in May** in 1933 the lyrics by Mitchell Parish. Mark began this one as a ballad and transitioned to jazz.

Jerome Kern Selections came next. He composed over 700 pieces and is one of Mark's top four composers. Mark selected five for this medley which were: (A) **A Fine Romance** written for the 1936 movie "Swing Time" and introduced by Fred Astaire. (B) **Pick Yourself Up** again for "Swing Time". (C) **Can I Forget You** from 1937 movie "High, Wide, and Handsome". (D) **Bojangles of Harlem** also from "Swing Time". (E) **All the Things You Are** from the 1939 movie "Very Warm for May". I caught a little of "The Way You Look Tonight" as a couple of bridges in this one – a nice touch. Also noted another view of the performer and console from high up and to the right side. I really like these virtuals and their different angles.

The last selection is the most recent. The Flying Theme from the 1982 movie "E.T. the Extra Terrestrial" by John Williams and earned a Grammy Award for "Best Arrangement, Instrumental or A Cappella".

A wonderful evening, Mark, hope to see you again, for real the next time. Thanks again.

Question Answered by Paul Harris

Following one of the recent virtual concerts, a viewer inquired as to the function of the control buttons in the panel at the side of the key desk. There are two control panels at the key desk - one on the left and one on the right. These panels contain toggle switches that control organ functions for which there is not space available on the horseshoe stop rails, but need to be accessed during a performance and, therefore, are not included in the programmable stop control box. The button lights when the function is active.

The panel on the left controls the following functions:

GENERAL

- Accompaniment Second Touch Pistons Off
- Solo Egyptian Horn 8'
- Orchestral Egyptian Horn 16'
- Orchestral Egyptian Horn 8'

ACCOMPANIMENT TRAPS

- Triangle
- Snare Drum Roll

- MIDI Traps

- Triangle

- Up

- Choke Cymbal

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Will the Kimball Continue?

All of us are proud of the reputation of the Dickinson Theatre Organ Society – especially the sound of the Dickinson Kimball. Over the years the organ has become know as an instrument where everything works.

This reputation is because of a special group of people whose faithful dedication has kept the organ in top notch condition – the Organ Crew.

Before they joined the crew, many had had no experience with the delicate, complicated mechanism that is a theatre pipe organ. Current members of the crew are willing to teach newcomers the skills needed to maintain the organ, insuring that the organ will continue its top notch condition.

At the present time, the current crew can handle most of the problems, but more people are needed as we open our next season.

The need is urgent. The work is not difficult and does not consume a great deal of time for most repairs. A variety of uncomplicated skills are needed. Niow is the time for new crew member to learn the skills needed as we enter the new season.

One of the "perks" of being on the crew is gaining the knowledge of what a theatre pipe organ really is and how it works. Then, as you listen to it you'll know what is happening in the chambers to make the wonderful sound.

Ask Paul Harris (Crew Chief), or Paul Pringle, what would be involved in being a member of the crew.

The organ crew meet every Wednesday morning from 9am to 1pm.

The bottom line is this. We are desperately looking for volunteers for our organ crew. Without that crew, the future of the Dickinson Kimball is very dim. We could be forced to cancel any future plans for concerts. Members of the Board and others have heard too many details from artists hired for a concert that arrived at the venue and found an organ that was not in fit condition for a concert - dead notes, poor tuning, console in bad shape, etc. This is not the reputaion we want for DTOS.
