52nd with a Bang! Sat. Sept. 18 at 2:30pm

Our first event is an new, revised FREE Open House

There will be three parts to the Open House this year. The **first** will be an Open Console period from 1pm to 2:00pm with 15 minute time slots available. If you want to play the organ, or even just sit at the console, you will need to schedule your time period. We urge you to call for your reservation ASAP. Call Bob Dilworth 302.998.2803.

While anyone is welcome to sit and listen during open console, the second and third parts of the event are aimed for the general public.

The **second** part of the program, starting at 2:15pm, will be a short period of information about the organ and what is making all that music.

The **Third** part will be a very relaxed period of organ music by famed organist **Dick Smith.** You will be able to submit your request for him to play.

During that time, you do not have to sit in a seat but can walk around to listen to the organ from different locations in the auditorium or even stand behind the console to watch Dick create his magic. And if you want, you can wander onto the stage but be warned – the vibrations of the pipes on the balcony make the floor vibrate. More than one person has questioned if we were having an earthquake.

So... This is a time to hear the organ live, meet your friends, and introduce new friends to the organ.

Remember the date and time – Sept. 18, from 2:15pm to 4:00pm. Long live the Kimball ! (And DTOS)



Dick Smith has graced the bench of the Dickinson Kimball in concert more times than any other professional organist. He presents a program of favorites, often causing the audience members to find themselves toe tapping with the music.

He was the first DTOS artist to present a major orchestral transcription – *The Grand Canyon Suite* by Ferde Grofé.

He is also the artist who is known for the DTOS Third Half. After his concerts he returned to the console after the reception and played for as many as 400 who remained, some until he quit around 5am.

That Third Half was always very relaxed with requests for favorite songs from members of the audience. That is what we would like to recreate during this Open House. Not a formal concert, but an afternoon with Dick Smith enjoying the music he is creating.

There is no charge for this event.
It is free.
No tickets needed.

DTOS 52nd SEASON

Pipe Organ Unification by Paul Harris

The theatre pipe organ concept is made possible by a system of stop selection called unification. The idea for unification was conceived by an innovative organ builder named Robert Hope-Jones (1859-1914) considered by many to be the inventor of the theatre organ.

His thinking was that the pipe organ should be able to imitate the instruments and voices of an orchestra. His concept was made possible by the development of electrical control of the pipe organ mechanism which was the latest technology developed around the turn of the 20th century.

Electrical switching and relays made it possible to connect any set of pipes to any desired organ keyboard and even the pedal at any reasonable pitch. Today, sophisticated electronic logic systems perform the same functions.

Unification gives the theatre organ its unique flexibility, allowing an organ of modest size to sound like a much larger instrument. A skilled theatre organist can indeed create a sound very much reminiscent of a full orchestra. In the early days, the instruments were, in fact, called "unit orchestras".

Covid 19 Information

We are all concerned about the way that Covid-19 has affected our lives for the past year. DTOS also has been concerned – and is still concerned.

DTOS will follow the directives from our government.
